

Calbrisas Park

2451 California Avenue, .50 acres
Two playgrounds, reduced size basketball court, three picnic tables with barbeques (one handicapped accessible) and open field.
Artwork: "California Breezes" fence by Jon Cicchetti, tile medallions by artist Steve Elicker.

Discovery Well Park

2200 Temple Avenue, 4.9 acres (1.78 flat) Community Room (capacity 35), basketball half court, two sheltered picnic tables/two open picnic tables, three bbqs, amphitheater, pay phone, playground, and restrooms.
Artwork: Mural artist Joseph Giri, tile mural inside Community Center by artist Tom Barter.

Hillbrook Park, 1865 Temple Avenue, .54 acres Two covered/four open picnic tables, playground, brook, four barbeques.

Hilltop Park, 2351 Dawson Avenue, 3.2 acres, elevation 335', fantastic views; two covered/two

open picnic tables, two barbeques open space, eleven benches, restrooms, telescopes, trail connection, 1.2 million-gallon underground water reservoir.
Artwork: Mist Tower and Gallery Window by artists Jon Cicchetti, Tom Weir, and Craig Cree Stone, Friends of Signal Hill Library Millennial Brick Project.

Panorama Promenade, 2398 Dawson Avenue, .22 acres begins at Dawson Avenue cul-de-sac. The promenade links three parks and the Unity Monument, as well as provides scenic views and exercise stations.
Artwork: historic photos and descriptions at six viewpoints on the Promenade and loop trail.

Raymond Arbor Park, 1881 Raymond Avenue, .33 acres Fountain, neighborhood park, handicapped accessible, two open picnic tables, six benches, handicapped accessible playground, quiet space.
Artwork: decorative fence of birds .

Reservoir Park, 3315 Gundry Avenue, 2.78 acres Three open tables, one sheltered picnic tables, jumper space by permit, restrooms, playground, open grassy area, 4.7 million gallon water reservoir.

Signal Hill Park, 2175 Cherry Avenue, 10.07 acres Four sheltered picnic tables, two bbqs, jumper space

by permit, five mini-sheltered picnic tables, playground, amphitheater, two basketball courts with lights (one rentable), softball field (Spud Field, 60 ft. base distance, lights, rentable), restrooms.
Artwork: Ballwall mural by artist Greg Navarro Pickens and restroom tile and history work by Steve Elicker.



SHP Mural

Signal Hill Park Community Center (2,300 sq. ft.), 1780 E. Hill Street. Maximum capacity 100 for dining; carpeted floor. Available: kitchen with stove, sink, microwave, portable dance floor, and portable stage.

Sunset View Park, 2300 Skyline Drive,

.47 acres view park with three benches, seating plaza.
Artwork: solar interpretation for solstice and equinox. Park

also includes Tribute to the Roughnecks.

Temple Viewpoint, 2271 Temple Avenue, .02 acres view park, seating area with easterly view.

Tribute to the Roughnecks, 2300 Skyline Drive. The bronze-cast sculpture is of two men, Signal Hill Petroleum chairman Jerry Barto and Shell Oil employee Bruce Kerr, installing pipe into an oil line, symbolizing the oil rich history of the City and two of its key contributors. Sculptor: Cindy Jackson.

Unity Sculpture, Near the intersection of Temple Avenue, Panorama Promenade, and Skyline Drive. The 12' sculpture sits atop a four foot pedestal within a seating courtyard and is a part of the walking trails. Dedicated September 8, 2002, in memory of the victims of September 11. Sculptor: Patrick Vogel.

Veteran's Memorial, A war memorial to remember the soldiers from the City of Signal Hill. Located at the corner of Hill Street and Jessie Nelson Circle next to the Signal Hill Police Department.
