On June 10, 2022, the City's Water Conservation Program moved to Level 2 per mandate by the State Water Resources Control Board. Level 2 Restrictions include the following:

- ✓ Watering or irrigating is **ONLY** allowed 2 days per week on Tuesday and Saturday. Watering is allowed between 4 p.m. and 9 a.m. **ONLY**.
- ✓ Use of automated outdoor irrigation is prohibited within 48 hours following measurable rainfall.
- ✓ Excessive use, loss, or escape of water through leaks, breaks, or other malfunctions in the water user's plumbing must be repaired within 48 hours unless arrangements have been made with the City.
- ✓ Limits on Washing Vehicles: Using potable water to wash vehicles is prohibited except by use of a handheld bucket or similar container and hand-held hose with an automatic shut-off nozzle.
- ✓ Limits on Filling Residential Swimming Pools and Spas: Initial filling of residential swimming pools or outdoor spas with potable water is prohibited. Re-filling a residential pool or spa more than one-foot is prohibited.
- ✓ Commercial Landscape: Owners of commercial, industrial, and institutional properties (INCLUDING common areas of HOAs) **MUST NOT** use potable water.

Non-Functional Turf is defined as ground cover surface of mowed grass that is solely ornamental and not otherwise used for human recreation purposes. *Grass at City Parks is considered Recreational Turf and is therefore exempt from irrigation restrictions.

HILLTOP PARK VOTED ONE OF THE TOP EIGHT PLACES TO CATCH A SUNSET

Hilltop Park was recently voted by Los Angeles Times staff writer Christopher Reynolds as one of the eight places in L.A. to catch the sunset before it gets dark. Reynolds wrote: *"This little park (3.2 acres) looks directly south from Signal Hill across Long Beach to the Pacific, which begins 2.7 miles away. The hill is grassy and perfectly round. It has benches and palm trees, and the surrounding residential neighborhood is peppered with the occasional pump jack — those bobbing metal beasts that pull crude oil up from the earth. You can also see the skyscrapers of DTLA to the north. So this is a coastal, residential, urban, semi-industrial sunset spot."*

2022-2023 SLURRY SEAL PROJECT

The next phase of street slurry seal will begin early 2023. The Slurry Project will include application of Class II Slurry Seal coating on certain local and collector streets, asphalt pavement repair in select locations, and restoration of traffic striping and marking. This phase will include work on the following Avenues: Lewis, Lemon, Cerritos, and Orizaba. (see below for locations)



AB 1276 - SINGLE-USE FOODWARE

On October 5, 2021, Governor Gavin Newsom signed into law AB 1276 which prohibits food facilities from providing single-use foodware and condiments without first being requested by a consumer.

On June 28, 2022, the Signal Hill City Council held a public hearing to introduce an ordinance adding Chapter 8.14 to the Signal Hill Municipal Code, relating to Single-Use Foodware Accessories and Condiments. On July 12, 2022, the ordinance was adopted.

Hazardous materials and electronic waste are accepted at the Signal Hill facility on the second and fourth Saturdays of each month. If a holiday falls on the fourth Saturday, they are closed.



Spring Cleanup Week – May 1st through May 5th

During the scheduled collection week, single-family residences can set out bulky items at the curb for collection on their regularly scheduled collection day. Residents in multi-family complexes should call EDCO at (562) 597-0608 to arrange for a special free pick-up prior to the scheduled free pickup week.

Bulky items include any household goods, such as washers and dryers, furniture, and mattresses.

CITY PLANNING NEWS

GATEWAY CENTER NORTH SPECIFIC PLAN (SP-12)

The Self-Storage Project is part of a commercial center Specific Plan called the Gateway Center North Specific Plan, which was approved in 2022. The SP includes several phases of improvements/development. The first was the major remodel to the existing Target store located at 950 E. 33rd St., Signal Hill. The second phase is a new self-storage facility and new freeway oriented commercial center sign, to replace the older existing Target sign. Phase three will be the development of three additional retail/commercial pads in the center.



The new Self Storage project is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2023.



A new pylon sign has been approved by the Planning Commission, to replace existing sign at California Avenue and I-405.



The City was awarded a Gold Level Energy Action Award from the Gateway Cities Energy Working Group. The Energy Working Group awards points for activities such as completing a comprehensive energy analysis and completing energy efficient projects. The award was presented to the City Council at the Tuesday, January 24 City Council meeting.

DOG LICENSE RENEWAL

Dog licenses are required to be renewed each year. To purchase a dog license from the Community Services Department, please present a current rabies inoculation certificate (must be good for the entire licensing period). For all new dog licenses, a certificate of sterility if the dog has been spayed or neutered must be shown.

The City of Signal Hill contracts with the City of Long Beach Animal Care for services. All dogs, age four months and older, are required to have a current dog license by local municipal codes (Signal Hill SHMC 6.08.010).



Dog License Costs:

- ◆ \$95 Unaltered
- ◆ \$20 Altered
- ◆ \$10 Altered – (Seniors Age 60+) – good for one dog per household
- ◆ \$30 Late Fee
- ◆ \$10 Dog License Tag/Replacement Tags
